In the mission

One part of my ministry that I do not often write about is my responsibilities with the European Christian Mission. As the church matures, there is less that I need to do there, and I have been able to use more time helping other missionaries in their ministries. This has mainly been in two ways: firstly, being responsible for all the ECM ministries in Italy, and secondly, working with all the leaders of the various countries on the future direction of the mission and on how we can help the current ministries on the field. However, it has been difficult to do the latter part lately. We do have fairly regular Skype meetings together to keep the work going. I am usually able to participate in these meetings, although sometimes I have taken minutes of meetings with a baby or two in my lap, or had to miss them because I was looking after the children. The best work gets done when we get to meet each other and have a good time in relationships, although as before I have had to miss a few of these meetings, and will miss some more still, due to the family situation. So it was great, when Pinuccia's parents were staying with us recently, that I could leave the family with them, and go to England for a meeting. It was just one very full day, with a couple of days for travelling, but it was worthwhile being able to see and work with friends and colleagues that I have known for many years. Unfortunately it is back to normal now, and whilst most of the leadership of the mission is meeting in Madrid this week, I am at home with the other responsibilities that God has given me.

"And so it ends", said Gioia wistfully and a bit nostalgically as we left the cinema. She is one of the four 13 year old girls in their third and final year of the Sunday School class I teach, which corresponds to the three years of middle school in Italy. (There are also two others in the class who are a year younger.) Then this November we reached the climax of our program, and went to the cinema together to watch the fourth and final episode, which had just been released.

So, I'm happy that they are ready for the next stage in their life, being able to reflect from a Christian view point on the many different messages that they will hear.
